We decided to focus on youth, to reduce or eliminate stigma to decrease the eight to 10 years between first onset of symptoms and treatment. We know that with education and treatment, young people's futures can be improved. We reached out to involve broad representation from the community to deliver the anti-stigma message and advocate for ways to disseminate it. The initiative later became known as Help & Hope for YOUth (HH4Y). The "in school" portion incorporated the evidence-based NAMI Ending the Silence Program (ETS). ETS presentations cover the warning signs of mental illness and suicidal ideation. Young presenters who recognized they had a mental health condition in those years share their lived experience story to students to break through the stigma, get the conversation going and encourage young people to reach out for help. The ultimate goal of the initiative was to build a coalition to work with the Arizona Department of Education to require mental health education in K-12 schools throughout Arizona (S.B. 1376 was passed in 2021.)
